NECHAKO WHITE STURGEON **DISTRIBUTION AND HABITA**

White sturgeon (Acipenser transmontanus) has lived within the Fraser River watershed for over 10,000 years. There are four populations of White Sturgeon in the Fraser River watershed, three of which are Endangered and overlap in range near Prince George.

- Nechako
- Upper Fraser
- Middle Fraser
- Lower Fraser



The distributions of three of the populations are shown on the map, along with a zone of overlap, as research has shown that some individual fish move between these boundaries.

NECHAKO:

- The only known sturgeon spawning site in the Nechako River is in Vanderhoof at Riverside Park.
- The large lakes in the watershed provide overwintering habitat.
- The Nechako White Sturgeon **Recovery Centre is a conservation** hatchery supporting the recovery of the sturgeon in this river.





Critical Habitat

Areas that provide:

- refuge from fast flowing water
- food sources like insects, salmon, and fish eggs



- adequate spawning gravels
- structures to hide from predators

The primary human activities that threaten white sturgeon include:

- habitat loss
- river regulation
- invasive species introductions
- direct and indirect harvest
- loss of food source
